We thank all of our supporters and our dedicated Goodwill team for working together to propel this initiative forward over the past year and into the years ahead.





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GLEN LADSON

OVERCOMING THE ODDS

Valedictorian and proud marching band member
Glen Ladson graduated high school in 2011, with a 4.2 GPA and several scholarship opportunities.
Unfortunately, he found himself in a situation that required self-defense. He protected himself as best he could but his legal services did not.

Glen was sentenced to seven years in prison. Good behavior cut his sentence to six years and eight months. Upon leaving prison, he received a flyer for HealthRIGHT 360, a reentry program that provides vocational training and classes, including life skills and anger management, to help with the transition out of prison.

HealthRIGHT connected Glen to Goodwill Southern California (GSC) where he enrolled in a three-week janitorial program and completed 300 hours of onthe-job training. On his last day of training, a GSC representative asked about his experience and, subsequently, offered Glen a job.

Glen is a Program Assistant for LA:RISE, helping other members of the reentry population through transitional programs. Every intake group is special to him because he sat in the exact same seat. Because of his experience, Glen cares deeply about helping others transition onward.

LA: RISE

Goodwill Southern California is proud to participate in the LA: RISE program, which creates an employer-driven pathway integrating public, private, non-profit, and educational systems to support individuals on their way to full-time employment. Social enterprises provide supportive work environments that offer on-the-job training and skill development for hard-to-serve populations.

DEAF CAREER SERVICES INCLUSION & OPPORTUNITY

Goodwill Southern California's Deaf Career Services addresses barriers to employment and provides job opportunities or referrals to improve skill sets. We coordinate and collaborate with partners who recognize the unique skills, talents, and experience offered by the deaf and hard-of-hearing community.

Our services help the deaf and hard-of-hearing enter the workforce and obtain sustainable employment. Our goal is to empower participants with training and education so they may achieve their maximum potential through increased independence, productivity, and workplace integration.

Assisted technology is available and used on a daily basis, including video phones with operators, available 24/7, who can translate sign language into spoken words and vice versa.

LARENCE CHON

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE

In 2007, Larence returned home from military service in Iraq. He went on many job interviews. Employers said "Thank you for your service." None of them called him back. Feeling that there were no job opportunities for him in civilian life, Larence decided to re-enlist.

During his second deployment with the Army, Larence served as a medic. Larence's unit depended on him. In combat, Larence kept his team safe in a chaotic environment but it did not come without personal consequences. Larence was hit by multiple Improvised Explosive Devices. However, he was committed to his unit. Although Larence struggled with pain from shrapnel in his body and multiple concussions, he ensured his team made it home safely.

The work took a toll on Larence's body. He had four discs removed and replaced in his back, suffered two cracked vertebrae, a reconstructed left foot, and years of physical and emotional rehabilitation. Honorably discharged and sent home because of his injuries, Larence once again began a job search.



The Department of Veteran Affairs referred Larence to Goodwill Southern California to participate in our Veteran Work Assessment Program. After spending three months with us, he found a job working for Goodwill SoCal. Today Larence supports his veteran brothers and sisters by taking care of them during their reentry into civilian life.

"Goodwill helps veterans with everything they need," says Larence. "They help you with training, job placement, clothing, and transportation."

Goodwill takes pride supporting our nation's veterans. Larence sacrificed for the sake of his country every day while on the battlefield. He now helps other veterans the way Goodwill helped him.

MEET FAVIOLA

PROVIDING FOR HER FAMILY

Faviola, single mother of three, was unemployed and homeless with minimal education. "It was very hard on my children, especially on my oldest, because he knew he didn't have a home," said Faviola. The family hit rock bottom. Living with no car, limited food and water, Faviola was discouraged because employers wanted applicants with either experience or education.

In November 2017, Faviola made the decision to provide a better life for her family. She saw a Facebook post for Goodwill Southern California's Victorville Youth Services Program and contacted Goodwill.

The Goodwill team helped Faviola with supportive services for her children, transportation, and education to become a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA). The team provided her with support and encouragement to have confidence that she would succeed.

"Since my first day, I felt at home. Goodwill took care of everything," said Faviola. "There are no words to describe what Goodwill SoCal has done for me."

Now Faviola is not only working full-time, but she is also going back to school to become a Registered Nurse. Despite being a full-time mom, full-time CNA, and a full-time student, Faviola still keeps in close contact with the Victorville Goodwill team. Faviola is planning to graduate with her Associate's degree in nursing by Fall 2019.



In 2018, GSC introduced a new employment training opportunity for program participants with disabilities and disadvantages. Our Direct to Garment Printing department offers skills training and paid, hands-on work experience in digital apparel printing.

Participants learn the garment printing process from start to finish including working with computer software to upload designs, pretreating garments to prepare them for the printing process, using a heat press to dry garments, positioning, printing, curing and packaging. Participants take pride in the finished products that are printed for a variety of customers throughout Southern California.

The ultimate goal of course, is to help our participants develop skills that will take them beyond GSC and into sustainable employment in the community.

GSC's Tapping the Talents of Unique

GSC's Tapping the Talents of Unique Populations Forum in Ontario, September 2018, brought community leaders together to discuss the importance of partnerships in strengthening the local workforce economy.

In January 2018, GSC began helping Kaiser Permanente match work-ready individuals with entry-level positions at Kaiser in Fontana, Ontario, and Riverside medical centers. These positions in housekeeping, the appointment center, and food and nutrition services are critical to delivering safe, quality care and ensuring hospital operational efficiency. The jobs previously exceeded a 50% turnover rate. The partnership is showing remarkable results, filling over 90 positions with a retention rate of approximately 90%.

"Kaiser Permanente's High Impact Hiring program is a great example of how a mission-driven organization can truly step up and improve lives," said Patrick McClenahan, President and CEO of GSC. "I challenge other employers to follow Kaiser's lead and join us in making good jobs available to those who need a hand up, and an opportunity."

Other Kaiser Permanente Southern California medical centers are now pursuing similar high impact hiring collaborations with community-based organizations like Goodwill.

On May 10, 2018, hundreds gathered for the ribbon cutting and grand opening of the East San Gabriel Valley America's Job Center of California (AJCC). The AJCC opened at the Hacienda La Puente Unified School District at their Adult Education Willow Campus. The AJCC, operated by Goodwill Southern California, is a one-stop-shop for workforce services.

The East San Gabriel Valley AJCC provides job seekers with assistance in assessing skills, finding job opportunities, help preparing a resume, accessing academic support and more. This is the first AJCC in Los Angeles County to open on a school district facility.

"We strive to enhance the dignity and quality of life of individuals and families through education and skill training. We are proud to be the operator of this AJCC which will help build the skills and career goals of many individuals," said Patrick McClenahan.

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
